

Barkskins by Annie Proulx

A novel of fiction but a serious comment on early logging of the native forests of Canada and New Zealand. The story begins in 1693 and ends in 2013 — a period of about 300 years!

It follows the growth and development of a widely dispersed family of mixed origins - French, German, Dutch and Native Indian, beginning with the native Indian (from the

Mi'kmaw nation) and following the ever widening family who from time to time inherit part of or the whole of the expanding and fabulously wealthy business of timber getting and eventually milling, finishing, plywood and fibreboard manufacturing, paper making etc.

Shipping and export also

becomes a large part of their empire.

Through the many relationships, both expected and unexpected, the maturing family becomes large, scattered and multinational; the story follows the relationships and weaves them into the development and ongoings of the family empire.

Keeping the business in the family (by inheritance) over hundreds of years and many generations is a complex task and fortunes are both made and lost.

It is quite startling how many lives are lost due to unnatural causes such as accidents riding the logs on the rivers, bush fires, accidents with the axes when cutting the widow makers, accidents with drag lines, fights and murders,

and of course many die of illnesses, disease and simply old age.

Proulx can write quite darkly at times. Some descriptions of desperate characters, families in wretched circumstance, one man's treatment of another and so on are quite unsettling.

She can be a very descriptive writer giving the reader sharp images with clarifying focus — no room for misconception!

Raping and wastefully destroying the vast pine, redwood, forests of Canada and the kauri forests of New Zealand goes on for years decades, even hundreds of years with no thought of the importance of these forests to the indigenous inhabitants for whom the forests are everything—providing food, shelter, medicines, warmth and spiritual meaning. No thought is given to the long term future of these forests nor the effect of their decimation on human existence or on the destruction of wildlife through habitat loss. The wanton waste attributed to poor tree felling practices, cutting unsuitable trees, burning of excellent valuable stout timbers such as could make excellent ships masts or housing timbers, and to clearing the land for agriculture, informs one of the gung-ho attitudes of those early invaders who came in waves of thousands. (Genocide of

indigenous races, forest clearing and decimation of wildlife habitat is a familiar part of Australian history.) Clearing of the forest giants to make way for the planting of crop, met with the usual disaster of land slips and exposure of generally unfertile soil - as the stabilisation and nutriments were removed with the trees. Dieter, the German born member of the family empire, saw from the beginning how the felled forests needed to be replanted to secure a long term future for forestry and its products. He grew seedlings and seed in a nursery which he either planted or sold on. The story implies that sustainable methods based on

Dieter's work had to be eventually adopted in Canada to serve the paper and plywood industries, etc.

This is a serious read of some seven hundred pages with many twists and turns, love stories, triumph and ruin, pride and disgrace and all the rest of it. An engrossing tail told by an outstanding writer and story teller. If you have the time and the desire, please read this one - it is worth it.

(Proulx's many well known works include The Shipping News and Brokeback Mountain.)
