The Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) are reviewing the Landcare Facilitator Program.

The Victorian Landcare Facilitator Program funds 78 part-time Landcare facilitators who are employed directly by a range of organisations including Landcare and environmental groups and networks.



For continued funding for 2020-21, an Expression of Interest will open later in the year for Landcare and environmental volunteer groups and networks who would like to seek funding to employ a Landcare Facilitator from 1 January 2021 under the Victorian Landcare Facilitator Program. This new program is competitive and is open to any community group that is considered environment friendly.

The HCCC committee is currently working on an EOI and will be submitting an application to continue to employ our hard-working facilitators. To strengthen our case we need to develop a membership register to show support for the work Landcare has done and will continue to do.

Currently the HCCC does not have any official members. Any community member with any an interest in Landcare and sustainable farming has always been welcome to attend meeting and participate in Landcare activities at no membership costs.

We are requesting the readers of the Granite News become official members of the HCCC.

# River Red Gum - (Eucalyptus Camaldulensis)

The mighty River Red Gum is a common species of eucalyptus and found in most areas of Australia, but in particular throughout the Murray-Darling Basin. It is an iconic and important species of this catchment, both ecologically & economically, & commonly grows on riverine sites.

River red gums are a perennial, single-stemmed, large-boled, medium-sized to tall tree to 30 m high although there are some records of trees to 45 m. It is also estimated that these trees could reach ages of 500 to 1000 years.

The trees possess deep sinker roots and these roots have extremely high rates of hydraulic conductivity, making them very effective in conducting water. This high water use of river red gums contributes to maintaining water tables at depth. They also demonstrate moderate salt tolerance.

River red gum forest wetlands provide habitat for fish and waterbirds (breeding, feeding and refuge areas). Hollows in river red gums provide habitat for water and forest birds.

Pollination is mainly by insects but also by birds and small mammals. Flowering in most years is from late spring to mid-summer although about 45% of flowers fail to mature. River red gums have probably one of the fastest growth rates for a tree and, with a good water supply, can attain a height of 12-15 m in a few years, with flood timing affecting germination success.

River red gums obtain water from three main sources: ground water, rainfall and river flooding. It is river flooding which enables the species to survive in semi-arid areas, although permanent inundation results in tree death. However it is also very fire sensitive and even low intensity fires may cause injury and a fire kills regeneration.

River red gum forests are historically and culturally important due to the number of significant Aboriginal sites they contain. Common relics include canoe and shield trees. Such trees show scars where the bark was removed. Since European settlement the wood has also been used for heavy construction, railway sleepers, flooring, framing, fencing, plywood and veneer manufacture, wood turning, firewood and charcoal production.

These majestic trees are also of major importance as a source of honey, producing heavy yields of nectar in good seasons as well as providing bees with an important source of good quality pollen.

Stands of river red gum are associated with the surface flooding regime of watercourses and related ground water flow. The species is a profligate and opportunistic water user, and this is a contributing factor to the maintenance of water tables at depth. Even without large amounts of empirical data it is clear that loss of large tracts of the species in the Murray River corridor would have a major impact on the hydrology of the system, as well as on vegetation communities and associated biodiversity.
