#### **Executive Summary**

In July 2023, as part of the Victoria Government's Rural Council Transformation Program (RCTP) the four councils of Murrindindi, Mansfield, Benalla and Strathbogie resolved to support the awarding of a contract by Mansfield Shire Council (Project lead) to Logicalis Pty Ltd to implement an information management business solution across the four councils.

Following the signing of contracts Logicalis has advised Mansfield Shire Council of a material cost error in their original tender response and requested that the implementation costs be amended from \$469,200 to \$588,900 (Excluding GST).

It is agreed by the tender evaluation team, consisting of representation across the four councils, that the pricing error was a genuine mistake. Logicalis has discounted the pricing error to minimize the cost impact on the project budget and they remained the best value and preferred supplier after adjusting the tender evaluation scoring to take the pricing change into account.

The price increase can be funded from the existing grant-funded project budget without requiring additional funds from the councils. Holding Logicalis to the original price was considered a high-risk approach, with the likelihood that project outcomes may be significantly diminished.

It is recommended that Council endorse a variation to the contract between Mansfield Shire Council and Logicalis to recognise the price increase.

#### **Executive Summary**

Steavenson Road and Aroona Drive in Buxton are local gravel access streets that provide access to 28 properties. Residents are frustrated with the poor condition of the roads and have petitioned to have the roads sealed to meet the typical standard for a residential area.

In February 2020, Council surveyed property owners to gauge their interest in a special charge scheme to construct these roads. At that time, there was minimal interest and the threshold to continue with a special charge was not met. Under Murrindindi's Special Charge Scheme Policy, Council cannot consider investigating a special charge scheme for four years after abandoning the process. Therefore, Council could consider consulting with property owners in March 2024 to determine their interest in a contribution scheme, in accordance with the Special Charge Scheme for Infrastructure Policy.

The legislation governing special rate schemes has been updated in the last year and there are some additional constraints on the length of time a potential scheme can be held open. As a result, the Murrindindi Special Charge Schemes for Infrastructure Policy will be reviewed in accordance with the updated legislation.

Purpose For decision

#### **Executive Summary**

Bon Street in Alexandra is a local residential street primarily used by residents to access their properties. Over time, the street has been gradually developed with sections of kerb and channel, underground drainage, and varying road seal width. There is an over-dimensional route parallel to Bon Street along William Street, which is intended to carry commercial traffic traveling between the Maroondah Highway north of Alexandra and the Goulburn Valley Highway east of Alexandra.

Despite the existence of this over-dimensional route, residents have petitioned the council to widen and upgrade Bon Street due to an increase in commercial traffic using the street. A traffic count of Bon Street confirms the petitioners' observations, indicating a high percentage of commercial vehicles using the street. Additionally, Bon Street is narrower and lacks kerb and channel, making it unsuitable for heavy commercial traffic.

To address the concerns of Bon Street residents and improve traffic safety, the following solutions are proposed:

- Consult with the Department of Transport and Planning on upgrading and renewing the over-dimensional signage along William Street to make it more visible and effective.
- Consider future funding for constructing threshold treatments at the intersection of Bon Street to discourage commercial traffic from using the street. Threshold treatments are physical barriers or pavement markings that can deter larger vehicles from entering a particular area.
- Consider future funding options including a co-contribution through a special charge scheme with adjoining owners, for widening Bon Street and constructing kerb and channel to improve the road's safety and capacity for residential traffic.

Operations and maintenance programs throughout the shire continue to operate. The weather conditions have favored strong growth, and the Roadside slashing contractors are working through Kerrisdale, Flowerdale and Strath Creek at present, heading towards Kinglake.

The road Grading program is well underway with over 130km achieved so far.



The recent road line marking program is now complete with selected roads in Yea, Alexandra and Kinglake freshly re-painted.

The Kinglake Community Centre in conjunction with Taungurong Land and Water Council .has commenced painting a mural. This will be a welcome addition to the Community centre.

Flood damage works have been completed on Whanregarwen and Ghin Ghin roads. Works in Limestone, Molesworth, Eildon Glenburn and Castella have commenced.

I have joined the Community Roads Asset Group or GRAG second meeting. It is great to have community members willing to give their time and interest to this valuable initiative. Consultation with the community does aid council to make decisions regarding prioritising council programs.

## 7.6 Cr Damien Gallagher - Mayoral Report

Last Month, Murrindindi and Mitchell Shire Councillors, staff and community members came together to take 'Steps Towards Change'; walking together in a 16 Days of Activism event to send the message that our communities won't tolerate gender-based violence. I thank Mayor, Cr. Louise Bannister for hosting the event and for leading us on the day. The event also marked the launch of the Community Resource Guide to Family Violence, another valuable collaboration of the Mitchell and Murrindindi teams.

Late in November, the community came together for updates on the Shaping Murrindindi's Future transition project in Alexandra and Marysville. The sessions were an occasion to look ahead to the very focused discussions to be conducted in February, 2024, when community and industry passion is hoped to bring the six identified innovation opportunities to life. I encourage everyone to come along and to have a say in the future of the economy of our region.

In Wodonga last week, I met with the Local Government Minister and the Minister for Roads and Road Safety, the Hon. Melissa Horne MP at the invitation of the Department of Transport and Planning. An interactive workshop considered regional perspectives on road safety and I spoke about Murrindindi Shire's over-representation in road toll statistics, following up Council's recent letter of advocacy and call for additional attention for the significant hazard that major roads present for road users in Murrindindi Shire. The minister was generous with her time and engaged with representatives on the day.

On that evening, Council hosted a Flood Recovery Community Conversation meeting in Molesworth. The session was a stark reminder that the experience of the October floods in 2022 continues effect the lives of many in our community, and I'm very pleased that our flood recovery efforts are progressing professionally and methodically.

In Benalla, Murrindindi Shire Council chaired the Hume Region Local Government Network December meeting. The forum endorsed the advocacy agenda proposed by Murrindindi for:

- Rural council sustainability
- Road conditions and funding



- Planning considerations for large-scale renewables projects and decarbonisation more broadly
- Addressing key worker housing barriers

I'm looking forward to the forum establishing a vocal regional perspective on matters of concern to local Councils in north-central Victoria.

I'm continuing to learn of the escalation of impact from the lack of available childcare opportunities across Murrindindi. In 2024, I'll be exploring with Councillors and staff some creative, whole-of-community solutions to support families and key-workers to develop long-term plans to settle comfortably in the Shire of Murrindindi.

Community Christmas parties and gatherings in Taggerty, Buxton and Acheron, the Alexandra Community Christmas Tree Festival have me squarely in the Christmas spirit. Over the following week there are so many opportunities to celebrate the season with our community, including:

- The St. Luke's Carols Service in Yea, this Sunday evening, and
- The Alexandra Community Christmas Carols in Rotary Park on the Friday before Christmas.

Of course, this time of year is a valuable opportunity for reflection of our achievements in 2023, and on behalf of Council I'll be celebrating this evening at Alexandra Secondary College, and with Yea High School, and Alexandra Primary School over the coming week.

My thanks and appreciation go to the many local community initiatives (Embassy of Ideas, CH@T, and others) ensuring that everyone will be surrounded by joy and community on Christmas day.

To our youngest citizens, be on the lookout for Father Christmas who will be taking a reconnaissance mission around town on Alexandra Fire Trucks this coming Sunday from 9am.

On behalf of Councillors, I wish all staff, residents, businesses, dedicated volunteers, and our many visitors a very happy and healthy Christmas and festive season, and a safe, fun start to 2024.

## 7.7 Chief Executive Officer Report

#### **Grant applications**

I am pleased to advise that our applications for the 'Eildon Reserves Extension' and 'Yea Wetlands Access Expansion' projects have successfully passed the Expression of Interest stage of the Growing Regions Program and will now proceed to full applications due on 15 January. The application for the Eildon project is for \$1,380,000 and focuses on various enhancements including landscaping and safety features, while the ask for the Yea Wetlands project is \$596,000 and it aims to expand walking trails with boardwalks for improved birdwatching and visitor experience.

We are also on tract to lodge a funding application for a Tertiary Education hub under the Regional University Study Hubs program, which closes this Friday 15 December. The proposed location is in Yea with a satellite space in Alexandra.

I extend my appreciation to the Working Group who worked tirelessly over the past 3 months on this important initiative.

### **Updated Emergency Management Plan for 2024-2026**



Council has updated, the Municipal Emergency Management Plan (MEMP) 2024-2026 and submitted it for approval to the Hume Region Emergency Management Planning Committee. This plan aims to mitigate risks and manage the consequences of emergencies within the Shire, focusing on the protection of local communities, businesses, and the environment. It contains detailed local information and strategies tailored to the unique needs of the Murrindindi Shire.

### **Shaping Murrindindi Future**

- The project is sponsored by the State Government and aims to create a Local Development Strategy. Our objective is to identify and develop alternative industries in the Murrindindi area, transitioning from our historical reliance on native forestry. The planned seven-year transition has been expedited, with a complete cessation occurring as of the end of month.
- Having completed the context analysis, we are now entering the entrepreneurial exploration stage. This phase is critical for testing and refining the ideas we've gathered from our community and business consultations.
- The State Government is offering funding for proposals that demonstrate potential for job creation. Our team is actively engaging with local businesses, assisting one in relocating jobs to our area and supporting another in its local expansion efforts.

#### **Community Planning**

Community planning remains a key focus, fostering local engagement and empowerment. Recently, Council has endorsed the Thornton and Glenburn Community Plans, with both communities already making good progress in implementing these plans.

In Kinglake, our officers have commenced engagement, forming a core group and involving the broader community. We've held successful drop-in sessions in November and December, which saw positive participation and feedback.

Looking ahead, Flowerdale is on our radar with community planning set to commence. We're excited to announce a kick-off event on 18 February, 2024, with a community barbecue. This will be a great opportunity for everyone to contribute and shape the future of Flowerdale. The community's ongoing support and involvement are welcome and crucial to the success of these initiatives.

#### **Festive season**

As the festive season approaches, I'd like to extend a very warm thank you to everyone in the Murrindindi Shire. Your contributions, from community groups, volunteers, to businesses, have been invaluable in supporting our towns and communities.
