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Eildon Reserves Redevelopment

Council commenced the highly anticipated Eildon Reserves Redevelopment last month. The project, which is currently in progress, involves the transformation of Walter Moore and Thomas Marr Reserves, introducing a new playground, senior play space, skate park, splash park, and upgraded facilities.

Contractors are working in three stages to deliver the project by October 2024. During construction, the public toilet block is closed for upgrades, and safety fencing has been installed around the reserves. Utah Place has been closed and based on community feedback, will become a no-through road, providing a safe pedestrian link between the two reserves.

This \$6.1 million project is made possible with funding from State Government's *Regional Tourism Investment Fund*, *Local Sport Infrastructure Fund* and *Changing Places Fund*, and the Federal Government's *Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Fund*. Council's \$1.493 million contribution includes the proceeds from the future sale of two parcels of vacant Council owned land in the Eildon township.

It was another wonderful season at our swimming pools this summer, with approximately 22,000 visitors enjoying free entry at our pools in Alexandra, Eildon, Marysville and Yea.

Keeping you safe this season was our incredible team of lifequards, duty managers, and aquatic operations staff. We were pleased to host the VICSWIM Program at Eildon, Alexandra, and Yea throughout the school holidays. This Program provided a great low-cost opportunity for kids between the ages of 4 and 12 years to develop water safety skills, confidence and competence in the water, over a period of 4-5 days.

Four pool parties were held across the Shire, bringing even more summer fun to our pools. Approximately 600 attendees, across all four events, enjoyed live music from young local musicians, a free BBQ lunch, fresh fruit and icy poles, and pool games with prizes. These events were made possible with funding from the Victorian Government's FReeZA Youth Development Program.

Our pools are a wonderful way for everyone in our community to keep active and cool during the hot summer months. Thanks everyone for a great season at the Murrindindi Shire pools!

Council is preparing its draft Annual Budget for the next financial year. We aim to present the draft Budget to Council later this month for endorsement for community feedback during April.

Advocating for Our Community

One of Council's important functions is to advocate on behalf of our community – either in the form of government funding to help our Shire prosper, or to bring about changes to policies that will improve how we live and work.

Over the last few months, Council's advocacy efforts have been focusing particularly on road safety, boosting our grant funding from government, matters arising from recent floods and storm events, and the sustainability of our community and economy.

The Murrindindi and Strathbogie Shire Council Road Trauma Study 2021 revealed alarming road safety statistics for our region, with Murrindindi Shire recording the highest number of fatalities and crashes among small rural shires in Victoria, between 2010 and 2019. We are seeking \$100 million from state and federal governments over the next decade to modernise our road network.

Council faces a significant shortfall in grant funding. Despite being one of the least funded councils in the state, we maintain a large road network and rely heavily on grant funding for upgrades and improvements. We are calling for a review of the Victorian Grants Commission's methodology for allocating funding to councils, to reflect the financial burden faced by smaller councils like us.

We are also prioritising the sustainable development of the community and economy. We are seeking funding to deliver the Activating Lake Eildon Master Plan, including construction of the Skyline Road Touring Route. The plan aims to create jobs and support regional development around Lake Eildon. Council is asking for \$48 million to deliver four key activation projects as part of this plan.

Fair Access in Sport Policy Consultation

Council wants to ensure that local community sport is welcoming, accessible, and inclusive for everyone, and that our recreation facilities provide a level playing field for women and girls. In consultation with local community and clubs, we've developed a draft Fair Access in Sport Policy and Action Plan.

The Policy and Action Plan will help address barriers in access to sport and recreation, including use of sporting infrastructure, and build community capacity to identify and eliminate gender inequality.

Whether you work in sport, volunteer, or play sport yourself (or even if you don't), we'd appreciate your feedback. We want to make it easier for everyone to get involved in community sport and keep active.

Roads Advisory Group Update

Meeting in March, Council's Roads Advisory Group (CRAG) considered issues relating to Council's approach to road management across the Shire, including current and desired service levels, and the implications of changing Council's service levels to better meet community expectations. In addition, the Group reviewed the draft Capital Works Program for road assets proposed for 2024-2025.

CRAG's purpose is representing the local community on road management issues, and offering valuable feedback to guide Council decisions and practices.

The Group explored challenges that Council faces when managing roads, and provided Council with a better understanding of the values that are important to the community when it comes to local roads.

Shaping Murrindindi's Future Update

Workshops were held in February for community members to discuss several innovation opportunities and ideas for the region and local industries.

The workshops were delivered as part of the Shaping Murrindindi's Future Project, which is focused on assisting communities who are directly impacted by the transition away from native timber harvesting, particularly the areas of Marysville, Taggerty, Buxton and Alexandra, to identify and develop opportunities for economic diversification.

The workshops covered Farm Forestry, Renewable Energy and Circular Economy, Health, Aged Care and Social Assistance, Tourism and Sustainable Agriculture, Aquaculture and Horticulture.

A sixth workshop is set to be held in April on the topic of Advanced Manufacturing.

ideas recommended for further investigation will then progress to the next stage of the project, which involves establishing working groups to further test ideas and develop the project scope.

Registered Pets are Safe Pets

Do you own a dog or a cat? If your pet is registered with Council, you will soon receive your 2024-2025 pet registration renewal notice, due 10 April 2024. Nearly a quarter of Murrindindi Shire households own a dog or cat, and keeping them safe is important. That's why it's a legal requirement for all cats and dogs over the age of three months to be registered with Council, under the *Domestic* Animal Act 1994. This helps us reunite you with your beloved pet, if they are lost.

Can you tell us a bit about your professional background?

I've had a few different retail roles where I developed my Customer Service skills, before moving to work as a Receptionist in a Medical Clinic near Geelong.
